We set a date for the celebration. Everyone attended with anticipation and I attended with a bit of skepticism not knowing how this would turn out. The entire service was given to this celebration with those involved doing the speaking. I only got it stared. I had worked with the music director to coordinate the music with the different speakers. As the service began, we were all excited but unsure of where it would take us. As the service progressed, you could hear a sniffle here and there. Further along in the service, tissues were being passed around. As the service came to an end, every person in the building had been touched. It was a wonderful, spirit led, moving of God's spirit as we celebrated with those who shared about their struggles and how God had led them through it. For months after the service, people were still talking about the wonderful time we had in the Lord.

I write this here to maybe encourage some of our pastors or other pastors to try a day of celebrating what God has been doing in the lives of the people of the congregation. Many will come to the pastor's mind as this is being read. If planning is done ahead of time, great experiences can come from it. The service may touch many others in the congregation that are struggling as well. After all, who says the preacher has to preach all the time? Hearing about the victories from those who have gone through a difficult time may help someone else. After all, they can say it better than we.
